Instead, I picked up "Must Love Murder" and started reading.

Etta Faire's delightful novel about a 40-something heroine with a jerk ex-husband and three kids who is trying to solve the murder of an especially unpleasant old man was just what the doctor ordered - or would have if he'd had any sense. Well-plotted, well-written, with interesting and believable characters; "Must Love Murder" is one giant step ahead of most cozy mysteries and comes complete with a nice little romance woven into the narrative.

Faire's heroine - Marcie - has all the attributes that I look for in a female protagonist. It's true that she's a little awkward when it comes to some social situations, but at her core she's smart, loyal, and able to confront the issues in her life without giving up and giving in. She's not adept at martial arts and she isn't possessed of super-sharp deductive skills but she is determined to solve the murder of her aunt's neighbor not because she liked the man but because it's the right thing to do.

Faire has a nice narrative voice: Her story flows smoothly from page to page. She has included just the right amount of detail about what it's like to be a single mom raising three daughters on a limited budget so that, as readers, we get a good sense of who Marcie is and why she does what she does without forcing us to count every cup in her kitchen cabinets. I consider that a major plus.

The plot is not overly complicated - another plus in my opinion - but it does contain enough twists, turns, and red herrings to make it really interesting. I confess I did not figure out who the real killer was until Faire told me and, as someone who writes mystery novels myself, I can truthfully say that doesn't often happen.

This was the first Etta Faire book I've read but, based on how much I enjoyed this one - and how much it lifted my spirits during a particularly grueling few days - it certainly won't be the last. Nicely done, Ms. Faire; nicely done, indeed.
