"The Day I Was Crucified, as told by Christ Himself" by Gene Edwards is a powerful little book. I have very mixed feelings about it! Part one of this book is a work of fiction, and should only be viewed as fiction. I am afraid some might pick this up and view it as truth. Truth is found in the Holy Bible, and only in the Holy Bible. That said, I feel like I can now talk about this book.

In these two hundred pages is a story that is famous throughout the world, and it covers only a few days of the life of Christ. In part one we find Jesus in agony, praying desperately to His Father about His upcoming death. Edwards has made me "feel" some of the heartache Jesus might possibly have felt during this time. It is hard to even imagine the tremendous pain and suffering He went through on my behalf, so that I can go to heaven. So, besides the emotional turmoil that Edwards helps us understand on a deeper level, there is also the physical pain. No human could endure so much! Yet Christ willingly suffered in order to save mankind. Part two (the last 1/3) of "The Day I was Crucified," is a biblical narrative of the crucifixion and resurrection. Here Edwards has combined all four gospel accounts into one complete story that again tells of the crucifixion of Christ, only this time, he is using scripture.

As I said earlier, I have mixed feelings about this book. To me it feels wrong to put words in God's mouth. (Who am I to think I know the mind of Christ?) Yet, for some folks, Edwards' words might be just what they need to draw closer to Jesus. I would recommend you use this book as a tool, hoping it will lead you to search the scriptures for yourself. Perhaps it will help you understand how very loved you are by our heavenly Father!

Keep in mind this is "fiction" as the author couldn't actually know Jesus' thoughts; however, it was a new way to think about that fateful weekend.

This is a book like no other that I have read – the depiction of what author Gene Edwards sees as Jesus' view of the hours leading up to His death and resurrection. The battles in the spiritual realm, His suffering in prayer, His ultimate suffering, death – and then, victory! It is a must read for mature Christians, those who understand that the spiritual battles demonstrated could be especially considered during Lent, during the week commemorating Christ's death and resurrection, or any other time of year.

We as sinful human beings truly cannot know what Jesus experienced through those excruciatingly long, dreadful hours, but what we see from the heart of this author will change forever the understanding of the

crushing weight of our sin cost God, cost Jesus. The physical suffering of our Lord was not emphasized to the degree I might have anticipated. Instead, we see the demonstration of the possible immense spiritual battles that our Savior, Jesus, may have endured. For me, for my sins. Could I ever see a sin as little after reading this? I hope not!

The Day I Was Crucified is great literary work of this century to be sure; the author's insight into God's will for mankind – because He loves us so much more than we can imagine, includes scenes and struggles that I never considered. He includes the depravity faced by Jesus as inflicted the enemy of our soul and his demons, and the last enemy to be overcome – death. Not merely physical death, but the eternal damnation of our soul if we reject who Jesus is and what He has done.

If there are things included that might seem to go against what you have been taught before or what your church teaches, I would urge you to remember that the ultimate truth that the Lord wanted us to know this side of heaven is in the pages of Scripture. Remember that Part One of this book is not scripture, but a previously unexplored view of the spirit realm that those who were present at Christ's crucifixion were not privy to. Remember that nothing Jesus endured was a surprise to God – why else would Jesus have suffered so grievously in prayer the night before His death?

And as you consider the battles of Part One, you will find in Part Two a skillful compilation of the four Gospel accounts of Jesus' trials, crucifixion, and resurrection. While the version of Scripture is not noted, it is for many of us the very familiar truths of Jesus' final hours before His death, and His resurrection from death. To read these verses together is as if the Holy Thursday through Easter Sunday scriptures were all part of one long, tragic, victorious day.

We are gifted through this to have a glimpse of how great God's love is for us, how great Jesus' love for and obedience to His Father is. Now that we have so much more to reflect on than before, we also may consider how we live in the light of God's love and Jesus' glorious resurrection. I highly recommend this book to mature Christians of any age, and Christians who desire the growth in faith that might be imparted as they understand the outrageous sacrifice Jesus made on their behalf. Take your time with it. Reflect on what is truth in scripture, as well as the suggestions of what Jesus fought for so mightily for you as seen through the eyes of Gene Edwards. It can change your life.

Deeply Moving Account

This is the first time I have read a book by Gene Edwards. It is a work of fiction about the day Christ was crucified, told in words which Jesus might have spoken during that time. I wasn't sure what to expect of the book, but I could not put it down after I began. I received it in the mail, sat down to read in the evening, and finished the book in one sitting. It captured my attention from the first page.

There is an easy flow to the book, yet it is extremely moving and touching. As it is a work of fiction, the words of Christ are only the author's suggestion of what could have happened if one had lived during that time period and had actually been able to converse with and listen to Jesus. There are scripture references at the end of the book which coincide with the message of the story. It is a story which stirs emotion and understanding. It is an excellent read anytime during the year, but I think it would be an extremely powerful book to read each year during the season of Lent. I find it difficult to adequately describe the power and impact of this book. The last day of Jesus' earthly life is unfolded before the reader in vivid and heartbreaking language from Jesus' first person point of view. A sample excerpt: "...I laid down on the crossbeam and stretched out my arms. Father, permit even this. The soldiers stared at me. In all their experiences of executing men, they had never seen the victim willingly stretch out his arms to receive the nails. It was I and I alone who would consent to the Cross." The horribleness of His death is illustrated but not done in as graphic or gruesome manner as it could have been. Instead, the author focuses on the way Jesus might have understood the events through His divine eyes. He knew what was coming, willingly accepted His Father's will, but knew all that His death would mean and how the world would be changed forever. He also knew that "After my death I would yet lay my eyes on another door, the one that separates heaven from earth. After this day, the separation would be no more." The author takes particular care to describe Jesus' assault by the forces of evil—"those creatures that man's eyes cannot see" and His call to have them meet Him on the Cross along with the sins of man.

The book is written in an engaging manner which leads the reader to keep turning the pages until the climax. It is a fresh presentation of a familiar story, and it will stay with the reader long after the last sentence is read. I highly recommend it. This book attempts to give us an insight into thoughts of Christ during His Passion. The purpose is to lead us to reflect on what Jesus may have been thinking or feeling, and what His surroundings might have been like: transporting us into the days of Christ's crucifixion.

Although the goal of the book is commendable, and at times it invited reflection on Jesus' crucifixion, the book ultimately fails at its goal. It is filled with doctrinal inaccuracies, anachronisms, and fails to transport you to Israel in Jesus' times because of its vague descriptions and lack of depth. It deserves more context, and apart from its smooth syntax and grammar: it is poorly written.

That would be fine, were it not for the doctrinal errors in the book: most of which are found in the fictional account of Jesus' encounter with the personifications of: Sin, Worldliness, Law, and Lucifer. These conversations are unbiblical, and misleading: sin is personified as the one to blame for all the worlds problems (as if men are its victims), the Law is illustrated as abolished (Jesus clearly states He fulfills the Law, not abolish it; furthermore the Law is good and it represents God's righteousness, it is not the devil's instrument, and it is meant to lead us to repentance —to recognize our need of grace— rather than to destroy us), along with other problems.

Although the fictional part of the book has a serious amount of problems (go to the Bible for truth, not Gene Edwards), it provides a remedy in the end by providing a biblical narrative of Christ's Passion with the Gospels as a guide. This is the narrative you (as the author did) should cling to as a guide: it is faithful to the text, it is smooth reading, and it represents what REALLY happened.

I would not recommend reading this book, unless you have knowledge of Scriptures.

While the scriptures tell of the days of Christ's passion, Gene Edwards reveals what went on behind the scenes and the possibilities of Christ's thoughts through it all and afterwards. Good read.

My previous review I admit was a bit precocious, and maybe even inflammatory, so I retract and apologize for the tone in which it was presented, but I'm afraid the content and it's foundation must remain. I have serious concerns of a doctrinal nature based on my own understanding of the scriptures from 20 years of study and instruction which I will detail below in a series of challenges for you to use in your own evaluation. I present them in this way because I believe Edward's account has the potential to seriously skew your understanding of Jesus' death and resurrection as they are presented in the scriptures, which: 1) Has tremendous implications for the eternal state of your soul, and 2) Need to be brought up in a critical manner, since this book is supposed to be based on the Biblical accounts of these events. Let's begin.

1) The book description's assertions

I have un-related issues with the hyperbole used in the description and what they say about Edward's motives for writing the book in the first place, but I'll stick to the actual doctrinal critiques for now.

a) "See that infamous day not through the eyes, nor the voice of other men, but rather through the eyes and voice of the Lord Jesus Christ himself."

According to the Bible, who is it's author? (2 Timothy 3:16; 2 Peter 1:21) Evaluate this statement in light of these Scriptures.

b) "Because it is His account of His own death, you will discover little known aspects of Christ's death." Read Revelation 22:16-19. What does Jesus say about the completion of the Scriptures? Considering this, can there be any "little known aspects of Christ's death"? Consider the implications of Edward's assertion that this is "[Jesus'] account of His own death" in the light of this scripture. Are there any such accounts in the Bible? No. What, then, is he basing this account on?

c) Considering the above, what gives Edwards the authority to make these assertions about his book? How should these things affect your approach to it?

2) The Cup(s?)

a) In the whole of the Scriptures, what is the metaphor of the cup most often used to depict? (Search for "The cup of" and "poured out"). According to this, you could call it the cup of _____.

b) In Edward's depiction of Jesus' visions in the Garden of Gethsemane, you could call the cups the cups of _____.

c) Support with the Scriptures the doctrine of angelic atonement, which Edwards represents with the vision of the third cup.

d) Are there any Scriptural references to "cups" that Jesus may have asked to be passed from him individually? Evaluate Edward's use of the three cups in this light. I understand that Jesus was "made to be sin" for our sakes, but given the biblical use of the cup, does Edwards' merging of these ideas stand? How could these differences between the Scriptures and Edward's depictions affect your understanding of the Gospel?

I had more, but will stop there. Having now finished the book, I think it suffices to say that I cannot recommend it based on it's doctrinal flaws and uselessness as a means of knowing the Jesus presented in Scriptures. If you're interested in Edward's personal doctrinal postulations, this book is for you, but I strongly recommend continuing in your own Biblical analysis of his ideas. Even things as simple as the thief being in paradise without Jesus, when Jesus had said "Today, you will be WITH ME in paradise" should cause you to question them. The most troublesome to me is that the law was killed, as it were, with Christ and no longer has power over man. Search the Scriptures and see if this is true, and what the difference means. While his depictions of the "other world" are interesting, I find them questionable and would like to see Edward's biblical support for all that occurred on the cross and in the tomb. Without it, why am I reading this?

I can say I appreciated his connecting Jesus' wounded side to the creation of Eve, though I don't think Jesus would have thought of himself as being "alone". This idea really helps me understand what it means for the Church to be his bride and thus his helper. This one thought is hardly enough to redeem Edwards' muddling of Jesus' death and resurrection in this work.
