I'm also troubled by the use of sandcastles as a metaphor for remembrances of God's working in one's life. They're too fragile, too likely to be washed away by the wind and the sea. The Old Testament speaks of Ebenezers, made of stones/rocks, much more likely to stand to serve their purpose.

I did find the narrative simplistic and easy to follow, while having a preference for Ginny Saint's more natural flair for writing than Steve's matter of fact relay.
