I have to say I had mixed feelings about this book. I usually enjoy YA novels. I don't mind the whiny teenage girls running into trouble, mostly. Now this wasn't your usual teen drama. The main character is a pretty strong, and is trying to come to grips with her new life as a warrior in trusted with keeping the world safe. A lot of pressure for a teenage girl.

Overall I thin this book is geared better towards younger readers. It is done with no swears or sex making it a good possibility for the tweens but probably will be too clean for the average 16 year old.

The other thing is that most of the story narrator is the main character Gabby, but at some point the narration switches which I found a little confusing. It does switch back to Gabby after but I think the transition would be smoother if the chapter had some kind of header to alert the reader to the change. As a side bar I don't think the Elementi and Eternals need to have there names in italics every time, but thats probably just personal preference speaking.

To sum it up think this has an interesting storyline with a strong female lead character perfect for the younger teen set.

This was a fun teen book that will catch most young adult's attention.

There is a nice sense of pacing throughout the book. I've found that an issue with many YA books, the feeling that the author doesn't know how much detail, how much atmosphere to build, but this one was handled nicely. There is a slight issue with some of the word choices. I know that for many adults, cursing and bad language in general bother them, but in this case I think it was the lack of the usual curse words that made the dialogue feel a bit outdated. It felt forced, when it would have been much better to just insert the curse word. That's really the only thing that bugged me throughout the book.

The protagonist, Gabby is a bit different from the usual teen fare, since she is much stronger than we are used to reading about. She is not the whining teen we expect, making her refreshing to read about.

The ending, which I won't reveal was done well, also. It leaves you looking forward to the series' next installment. This is one that I think teen will really enjoy and I do recommend it.

When I first started this book I was actually pretty excited about it. I knew it was going to be something that I could really get into. This book picks up where the first Gabby Girls Adventure ends...the four friends (Gabrielle, Jessica, Zora, and Rosalinda) have found out that they are part of a magical group. They now are to move to a different "school" and learn how to use their gifts and powers as Circles (magical/powerful women). Before they can make the trip to their new school the school they are at now is attacked and nearly everyone there is killed. The four girls are taken to safety and do get to their new school for training, but now their training must happen much faster to prepare them to fight in the war that is coming. Gabrielle is found to be the Akasha reincarnate and is seen to be the answer to the war problem, but how can a sixteen year old girl solve a problem like that? When the girls get to the new school Rosalinda seems to be distancing herself from the other three girls. She is acting weird and seems distracted a lot. She says it's her Dad's latest conversation, but is it really that? As training gets underway the girls form new friendships and gain new enemies too. It's not easy trying to focus on studies with a whole mess of major hot male classmates running around. Gabrielle soon discovers that not is all how it seems. Her Grandmother is on the Counsel at the school and is suddenly ill, but not because she is naturally sick...someone has put a black spell on her and she will be lost forever if Gabrielle can't find and "borrow" the special book of spells that is hidden and well guarded at the school. She enlists the help of her Gabby Girls again along with a new Gabby Girl, Brooklyn and a major cutie warrior, Justice (because he knows how to get to it). The plan starts to fall apart when Gabi and Zora finally find the book, but set off an alarm when they take it off the pedestal it was sitting on. Gabi and Justice stay behind to go up against the warriors coming, while the rest of the Gabby Girls are to take the book and run out and hide the book until Gabi gets back. Sounded like a good enough plan. So where's the catch? Not all the Gabby Girls should be trusted and Gabi makes a huge mistake handing the book off to the one Gabby Girl traitor of the bunch. She later finds (while she is in the dungeon for stealing the book along with Justice) that the book has been stolen by none other than a trusted Gabby Girl and she or the book are nowhere to be found. How can Gabi even try to fix things when she is locked away as punishment? Can she trust Justice to help her escape somehow? Can she find the Gabby Girl and the book in time to save her Grandmother's life...and prevent a war?

All-in-all I would say this was a good young adult read. It had action, adventure, humor, teen problems, friendships, and magic. It kept a good pace of what was going on, but I didn't find myself as sucked into this book as I did the first one. The action wasn't as Gabby Girl centered or quite as intense as in the first book. There was more center on who Gabrielle really is and on relationships she tries to form. I came to like the characters more in this book though because they became more in depth. I saw more of who they were as people and what they were as Circles and what they could do. It was interesting to see how they all stepped outside their comfort zones in the new school and with how they began to take an interest in the new boys that are at the new school too. I was a bit blown away by the twists in this book. Some of them flowed very well and I found myself thinking, oh man should have seen that coming. Others left me thinking, what that heck is with this. My favorite character is by far Gabrielle aka Gabi. I like to read young adult fiction, especially in this genre. There was some things I enjoyed about this series and some things I didn't. I didn't enjoy all the jumping around from character to character to try and tell the story. I usually like these books because of their first person reading and how interesting it is to be inside a characters head. I understand that the author does this to tell parts of the story that our main character isn't privy to. I just didn't like it.

I did like how strong the main character was. She was strong willed and strong with power and had been set up in this series as the prophesied saviour of her people so she is special. What I didn't like was her struggle with her destiny. I think she should wrestle with it and be harrowed by it at every turn and that's what the author tried to create. I just didn't really feel it myself. When she first finds out she is something special she doesn't immediately demand answers or find answers like what would be true to her character. She instead goes to school and does a full day of school. This is a character who has complete disregard for the rules at the drop of a hat. She is a rebel and doesn't back down. Why then would she go to school like it's a normal day when the day before some goddess told her she was special? Wouldn't she want to find out answers as soon as she can? This is just one instance where the character I was reading felt a little flat. The main characters friends felt a little stereotypical and flat as well with the bookish one only interested in studying, the one with body issues, and the shallow princess one.

Other than that the story was interesting. The author has created an interesting world with disgusting bad guys who tear people to shreds and the world in the balance if they fail. The main bad guy is a deranged female who craves power and has a grudge against the main characters. The world is about to implode with

war and only our main character can stop it.

I really enjoyed what the author did with her romantic interests. She introduced three possible guys that the main character could be interested in and kept the audience guessing about which one she might go after. One is the typical bad boy rebel. One is her possible soul mate but also tried to kill her in her other life. One is her mentor who has a thing with someone else but appears to become jealous when bad boy rebel comes into the picture. I enjoyed not knowing exactly who the author was leaning toward which was nice for a change where in these books the male lead shows up and then their attraction for each other is set in stone. Even when the author gave us a kiss between the main character and one of the guys it didn't really tell me anything. It could still go either way.

I have mixed feelings about this book. It was not a book that I had to read every free chance I had.

The story was interesting and has a lot of potential. I found the book refreshing in that it was a "clean" book. There was no swearing, or sex, or anything that would be considered inappropriate for younger readers. That was nice. With that being said however, some of the author's attempts at making it "clean" fell kind of on the corny side for me (an adult reader). Why say "back the heck off," when "back off" says the same thing and is just as clean. And, for me, a Warrior is not a "kick butt Warrior" but a "kick ass warrior." Again though, kudos to the author for wanting this to be a clean book but sometimes, just leave the clean alternatives out.

The main narrator of the story is Gabrielle Martin. She was a fairly strong character and realistic in that she questioned her role and her ability to step into that role. She was a typical teenage girl - kind of mouthy and moody but good at heart and means well. One confusing part was that although Gabrielle is the narrator

throughout the book, there was one chapter about half way through the book switches narrators to Queen Nemesis. That threw me off until I figured out who the narrator was. I actually had to go back to the previous chapter to make sure I wasn't missing something with the narrator. After that chapter, the narrator switches back to Gabrielle.

With a little polish and editing, this book definitely has some potential, especially for the middle grade/tween crowd.

Would I recommend it: I would recommend this book to girls in their tweens...middle grade. I would not call this a Young Adult book. I think it is too juvenile for the 16+ crowd. But the tween crowd, this would be a good fit.
