This is probably the weakest installment of Hickman's Avengers/New Avengers/Let's Blow Up The Universe mega-storyline, but it keeps the story moving, and it hints at many good things to come.

I truly enjoyed this volume. I love stories that involve cosmic entities. The fact that the Beyonders have come into the mix, and the hint that the original Beyonder ffrom Secret Wars I & II was only a child was mind blowing. That Beyonder was able to subdue even cosmic entities with ease. I guess this is all going to be a lead up to the new Secret Wars. I'm certainly in. The artowrk in this series seems to have improved, and

It looks like the stage is now properly set for volume 4, with all kinds of threats and animosities galore. Onward!
