Skye O'Malley was the very first historical romance I read (at the tender age of 12) and I've always had a place in my heart for that series. It has been several years since I read one of her books, and this one was a real disappointment. If it hadn't been an audiobook, I would have set it aside a long time ago.

Nothing really happens in this book. Rosamund, already 3 times a widow at the age of 21, sees Patrick Leslie, the Earl of Glenkirk (a name/title combo that is used/overused/abused - yes, we know who he is) and it's TWU WUV from the very first second. Then I'd say the next 60-70% of the book consists of:

- Rosamund and Patrick telling each other that they have a Special Eternal Love
- Rosamund and Patrick telling other characters that they have a Special Eternal Love
- Other characters telling Rosamund and Patrick that they have a Special Eternal Love

- Other characters telling other characters that Rosamund and Patrick have a Special Eternal Love

Boring and obnoxious? Oh, a *tad* .

The only action scene was a fairly good description of the Battle of Flodden Field, and another action scene was related by one character to another, but the rest of the book was simply people standing around and talking to each other.

And what would a Bertrice book be without:

- descriptions of clothes
- heroine taking a bath
- constant use of "God's Foot!", "God's Wounds!", "God's Blood!" and "God assoil his/her good soul"
- liberal sprinklings of "love lance", "love juices", and even an awesome "damp cave of her sex" (ETA: And how could I forget "manroot"?)
- the heroine has an awesome body after 3 births/4 pregnancies
- it's the 16th century and the heroine has all her teeth and they're brilliantly white and even

Perhaps even my beloved Skye series (even the earliest ones) are guilty of all these Mary-Sue violations and I'm both curious (and hesitant) to learn The Awful Truth. But at least shit happened to Skye - abducted to a harem, playing games of intrigue with Queen Bess, and running up against some of the worst villains a romance author could dream up. But this one was lifeless (you might say rendered toothless for today's more gentle reading audience), and seemed to run out of steam and totally switch gears at the end (view spoiler).

Oh, and she was girlhood friends with both Margaret Tudor (sister of Henry) and Catherine of Aragon. I mean, *come on* .

Definitely not her best (or even really good), and it makes me sad.
