Although I'm not the intended audience of this book, I still thoroughly enjoyed flicking through, appreciating the art and learning a little more about some of the destinations I have on my own travel bucket list - with featured cities including, Paris, Rome, Athens, Toronto, New York, San Francisco, Hong Kong, Tokyo and Sydney.

City Atlas is an interactive book - each city has five iconic items hidden within its spread and the reader is to find those items - and one that is sure to spark discussion among the children who read it, especially if it is explored by a family as a whole.

If you know a budding adventurer, a youngster who loves to discover new places, or are planning to visit any of the thirty cities with your own family, then this book is for you - it's the kind of non fiction book children will love, with unique illustrations, packed full of knowledge and perfect for the curiosity children may hold for cities other than their own.

This trivia packed geography book takes upper elementary reader on a whirlwind trip around the globe highlighting some of the world's most famous cities. Each two-page spread on a location contains a plethora of interesting locations that would be on any tourist's list also including some off-beat ones. The reader will learn some fast facts about the city, the country in which it's located, the language primarily spoken there, the population and an extra bonus; a challenge to locate an object that is hidden five times somewhere in the double page spread. City Atlas is a beautifully illustrated book, printed on high quality, durable paper, and securely bound. On each two-page spread are illustrations of significant sites of thirty featured cities. This is a book that an older elementary school-aged child can peruse by themselves over and over, or a book that an adult and child can engage with together. I rate this book a 4.5 because I was expecting a book that contained actual city maps, and the illustrations of the city maps form only a background to the city site illustrations. While I have a collection of junior fiction that I share with students, I rarely buy non-fiction titles. Transdisciplinary inquiries mean that non-fiction is always on the go in my classroom, but I'm perfectly content for my school to provide. Also non-fiction texts date in ways that picture books and stories don't and my preference is for books that endure year after year.

However, innovative publishing houses like Flying Eye Books and in this case, Wide Eyed Editions are changing it all up and I welcome their thoughtful, creative approach to non-fiction, even if it has much potential to be harsh on my budget! Take *City Atlas*. It has enough elements that junior atlases require to be a useful resource: maps, facts, but with the bonus of child-centred illustrations of city highlights, that blow standard atlases out of the water for interest level.

Like many, I teach children from everywhere and can imagine this book stimulating a lot of discussion about cities known and unknown. The lively illustrations are appealing and this atlas is full of cultural references. If I have a criticism, it's that the selected cities are northern hemisphere-centric, but I was happy that the Australian harbourside city of Sydney, that I know and love, is represented in fine form. Anyone for surfing?

I predict this book will be popular in many classrooms, north, south, east and west.

**Lots of potential for students to create their own atlas pages about real or imagined cities and plenty of opportunity to look at the use of imperatives (eg explore, toss, escape, enjoy) at the beginnings of instructional sentences - in a really interesting format. Making postage stamp art is the other obvious classroom connection.

Take a tour of some of the world's favorite cities to visit, and learn about fun things to do in each one.

This is technically an atlas, although it focuses on letting kids know fun things to do in each of the 30 cities highlighted. The map is loosely drawn of the city, and the focus is more on the sites. There's a short paragraph describing the city, three facts, and also a hidden picture challenge in the text box for each spread. Definitely a great resource if you happen to be visiting one of these cities in the future. It could help with planning what to do.

Another amazing book from Wide Eyed Editions! This time author Georgia Cherry and illustrator Martin Haake take young readers to thirty cities around the globe. Each city gets a two-page colorful spread with a rough outline of the city with rivers and coastlines traced and various landmarks on the map. There's a sidebar on each page that teaches children the country where the city is located, the (primary) language spoken there, and the population of the city. The colorful illustrations feel classic and modern at the same time with a colorful retro style to the pictures but the feel is also of an infographic with pictures and facts scattered all over the map. As if there isn't enough to keep readers poring over the pages, there is also a search and find element to each page. On each page Cherry and Haake ask readers to find a certain item in the illustration (for example, 5 slices of pizza in Rome). Readers can also find a character saying Hello in the city's language somewhere on the map. Entertaining and informative book that is aimed at kids but could

appeal to people of any age.
