In this second part of the four part serial storyline, Tova2 and Stefan discover immortal love-a new species so lonely, so vulnerable to extinction. The Queen of Sophista's unbridled ambition twists Stefan's mind. Will Tova2, the new chief enforcer, kill the Queen to protect her love? Will Stefan's teen meltdowns drive his enormous power to accidentally kill everyone? Stefan, the bio-battleground for so many races, struggles to understand who he is. Did his mentor and friend, Elof2, steal Tova2's heart? Perhaps... but perhaps Stefan, with the help of the Great Sophistan and Tova2, will discover the king of all within.

I think I definitely liked this book better than the first one. It was easier to relate to the characters in this one.

I particularly liked Paul25's and Tova2's growing relationship. It was really sweet how things progressed until they were more like mother and son. It didn't seem quite as realistic with Stefan and Paul1, though. I

would have liked to see more of their relationship form.

I did feel that things made a lot more sense with this book. It was nice to see events actually happening, rather than through flashbacks. I was a bit disappointed not to see more of Elof2 until the end, though - I'd like to have seen how things progressed to Paul7 wanting him to be his father.

I did quite like the fact that all of the clones had their own personalities. There were some really sweet moments in the book, too - like with how bothered Peter2 is about Paul1. I'm still kind of confused about the thing with Atreyu, though. I'm not sure if there were two characters with the same name, or if the Atreyu Paul25 knew was the same one from the first book.

The different types of writing were easier to read in this book as well. I did notice a few errors, though. There was one part where the tense changed from present to past.

I've started reading the third book in this series and it's currently just as good as this one. I think this is a good series so far and certainly worth the read.

Biesele does not fail to deliver in the second part of this fascinating and intricate series. Those who have read the first book will enjoy how the sequel keeps all of the lush world details and literary eye-candy of its predecessor, but also adds a new depth to the main characters. The plot thickens as new potential friends and enemies emerge from the woodwork.

Tova2 and Stefan feature much more prominently in this book, as does Paul25. The three of them form a triangle of emotion and developing wisdom, which is truly enjoyable to watch unfold. This triangle culminates with a literal combination of consciousness, making the three-as-one character(s) deeply involved with the events of the story and with each other. Newly blossoming romance between Tova and Stefan is crafted with care, Paul25 acting as a symbolic son to the two of them. This relationship is important to the plot, but does not overwhelm the story by any means. Stefan's mother also provides an intriguing character study, embodying envy, possessive love and also a paradoxical hopefulness in spite of her inner darkness.

This book is more involved than the first, which I had not initially thought possible, but therein lies the great skill of the author's writing. New secrets are revealed as the main characters gain new powers and abilities. While the first book was in many ways an exposition of Sophista's past, Rebirth of Innocents mostly takes place in the present, but there are some flashbacks to key events that serve to add more detail to the gradually unfolding timeline. While moving the plot forward a good deal, Rebirth of Innocents still leaves questions unanswered, waiting creatures to incubate in the reader's mind.

All in all, while this book was not as wham-bang as the previous installment, the depth and intimacy of the book

's connection with its characters more than makes up for this, and Rusty Biesele manages to add even more to the steadily growing world of Sophista.
