Although it was odd to transition back and forth between the current timeframe and Jack's past, I got used to it. In fact, many of Jack's journal entries were my favorite parts of the book. I think Schaub used some excellent references to the past, and I liked her details from the bygone era. I also admired the inner exploration that occurred with the younger characters of Alison and Trey. Plus, I enjoyed the mystery that they had to track down. My main issue with the story is that I thought the Eddie portion was superfluous. I felt that his transformation was too quick and not as believable. While I understood the significance of his decision and it highlights the ability of belief to change someone, I thought that the beauty of faith was already well-told using the other characters.
