I had the privilege of reading Severing Sanguine at the end of January, beginning of February. It got to Beta this with Mare, and while we didn't exactly read it all at the same time, I was so thankful that I had her to talk with. And of course, Quil. Ever since finishing, it's haunted me. I've been thinking about how the book made me feel, and every time I remember back to those couple of weeks I took to read it, I go through all the feels. All the emotions. And while most of those emotions are those of hurt, sadness, pain, and despair, I also smiled, cheered, and there is one moment where I laughed so hard and was so freaking happy that I cried from it.

It's hard to read... Our wonderful Sanguine goes through the shit, let me tell you. For me, this was harder to read than The Ghost in the Darkness, Volumes 1 and 2 put together. Much harder, and the first half is the hardest. Even now, a month later, every time I think about it, my heart hurts. The emotions surge and I want to make myself forget. The thing is, everything that happens in this book makes Sanguine into the man, into the immortal he is today. And our beautiful red eyed, sharp tooth Chimera, who I'd found nearly intriguing before, has turned me into his biggest fan.

Severing Sanguine takes you on a journey that you'll not soon forget. Just like the blurb says, we go through Sanguine's life starting from a small boy. This story takes place many years in the past, to a time before some of our favorite characters were even born, or created, and others are still very young, realitively speaking. It's a brutal undertaking and one I'm really grateful to have been on. Some of the best parts of this book are when we learn not only about Sanguine, but about his brothers. So many things are revealed. So many little bits of information are in this story that, if you've paid close attention in the other books, the lightbulb will go on in your mind and you be totally blown away. Those moments, for me, were like nothing else. Moments when I'd message Quil or Mare and shout out to them in all caps saying "OH MY FUCKING GOD, NO WAY"! It was so awesome.

Other times, I thought I was never going to stop crying. I hated those times. I mean, really, really, really hated those times. Did I curse Quil in this book? Yeah. I did that a lot.

Ugh, there is so much in this book! You might ask how this book fits into the series. All I can say is that it is pivotal. I guess you don't *need* to read it to continue on with the main books once they are written, but if Breaking Jade did anything to explain Elish and Jade's relationship and help you understand the why of things, this book explains more than you can imagine. To me, this is not just a companion book. This is book holds the story and secrets to the present.

**So, sensitive readers should beware.** If you have triggers such as child abuse, rape, murder... all the usual things, this isn't the book for you. I can't say that strongly enough. But if you are a seasoned Fallocaust reader, survivor and lover, you **have** to read this. I'd also say that Quil handles the exreamely difficult issues really well, with a gentle hand, and does not get graphic when the story does not call for it. But like any other book about the Fallocaust, it is bloody and totally insane. I believe that this book sets the stage for all things that happen later. It explains SO MUCH! Maybe just remember that I'm here for you if you need a shoulder to cry on. Or someone to shout at because you get so mad that you want to murder someone... hopefully not Quil.

Oh! There is one other thing that this book has done. You all know that I love Reaver. I love him like no other. But holy fuck, if this book didn't make me fall in love with Nero. I know! You're asking WTF I'm thinking, right? How could I, after what he did? I just gotta say... You don't even know, and what you don't

Severing Sanguine, a companion book to the Fallocaust series #2, has left me in shock and awe at this author's creative mind. I mean, how did Quil Carter come up with this storyline? It was a torture to wait for this book, so as soon as it appeared I forgot about the real life and started reading. It was simply impossible to put the book away, it captivated me right from the start.

I knew it would be painful. I knew there would be moments that could break my heart. I didn't expect to feel so much, though. Sanguine was probably the only character in the main series who I didn't understand at all, I wasn't particularly interested in him. But that small red-eyed boy who terrified everyone around him has won my heart from the first moment I saw him. His childhood was heartbreaking – it's appalling how people's intolerance and ignorance can turn them into ugly, spiteful beasts who only want to hurt and destroy. It was distressing to watch how sad and confused Sammi was because no one accepted him. Nan was wonderful, she did everything she could for him and it's impressive that even in the end she didn't want to give him up. She protected him as best as she could, and I really wish Sanguine knew what happened to her. I think she would have been thrilled and so proud to see him... if she was still alive. I'm scared to imagine what village people could have done to her.

Sammi kept breaking my heart with his attempts to find friends. The way his madness is described is completely brilliant – I loved him, I felt sorry for him, but he scared me sometimes. He's a chimera all right, it was obvious from his first moments on the Earth. It was both hard and fascinating to see how his mind worked, how he created all those imaginary people and talked to them, believed them, followed their orders. I hoped despite everything that Cory would be the one to help him, but, well... Sammi's little heart got broken once again. I just wanted to hug him and tell him he's not alone.

Jasper's ark was indeed difficult to read, but I am incredibly relieved and grateful that Quil didn't describe everything with all the gory details. He treaded softly and showed everything very carefully, he concentrated on the psychological aspect rather than on the physical one. So yes, reading about Sanguine's time at Jasper's was difficult, but not unbearable.

I was pleasantly shocked to see Juni! He was the last person I expected to meet in that hell-hole. I always wondered why he was made immortal, now I can guess at least.

I sympathized with Nero in the second book – this book made me fall in love with him. He's playful, he's loyal, he's fiercely protective of the ones he loves. And yes, he can love – he can be gentle, he can break down, he can suffer. Now I want a happy ending for Nero more than ever before – he deserves it, they all deserve it. Ceph was a surprise – I didn't expect to love him. I liked Kiki in Book 2, but now I think it's obvious that whatever Nero feels for him, his love for Ceph is primary. Sanguine's plan now is more or less clear – he finally got what he was waiting for. A chance for his brothers to reunite.

I deeply enjoyed Sanguine's time in Skyfall. The process of his adjustment is described very realistically - I was hurting for him, and I cheered whenever he made a small step forward.

I fell in love with Silas in the previous books despite his horrendous actions, this book made me love him even more. He's not as dark here - it seems his sanity is leaving him slowly, gradually. This book proved that there were times when Silas was kind and loving. I admired the way he behaved with Sanguine. I admired his patience, his love, even his guilt - his wrath once he realized what has been done to Sanguine. Yes, now I know why so many chimeras love their King. It's impossible not to. And I desperately want him not to die in the end - I wish he could get better. Reunite with Sky or another clone of him. He deserves to suffer for his mistakes, yes - but he's been suffering for many, many years. Silas keeps breaking my heart with every book.

Elish... wow. I'm crazy about Elish and in 'Severing Sanguine' he plays quite a big part. An unusual and surprising part, because I never expected to see him like that. I suspected there were times when he was in love with Silas and wanted to be his partner, but I never thought he loved him that much. Yes, Nero and Sanguine both told him that it wasn't love, but I think I disagree with them. In my opinion, Elish loved Silas sincerely, as only he could - his love was cold and blind, destructive. My, he even chose to betray Garret! It still horrifies me - I wonder if Garret knows. In Jade Elish has found his true soul-mate, but he did love Silas very much. I wonder when it changed, when this kind of love has turned into an overwhelming hatred. This question still hasn't been answered, but I think maybe we will see it in a book about Leo and Greyson. I love Elish and now I can appreciate every word, every gesture of affection he shows Jade. It amazes me that a cold, cruel and uncaring person like him could fall in love this much with a teenager. Now I want to re-read 'Breaking Jade'!

Sanguine's time in college and his meeting with Jack are unforgettable. I loved the university part - it seems this book has absolutely everything, it shows us every part of Sanguine's life. I was most impatient to see the story between Jack and Sanguine, and I'm very satisfied. They're amazing together. Jack astonished me when I first saw him here - he isn't like our Grim from Fallocaust books at all, he's just a teenager with his insecurities, hurt and hopes. He was rather weak at first - fascinatingly weak for someone who I know would later turn into a menacing, dark person. And Sanguine - broken, tortured Sanguine was the one who helped him get his strength. It worked both ways - Sanguine also became much stronger and confident thanks to Jack. They are like two parts of a whole, they deserve to be together. Beautiful romance.

Valentine surprised me most. I would have never imagined him being like that! At first he seemed like a brat to me, but then I just felt sad. He's a poor, rejected boy who has found his happiness only for a few short years. He deserved more.

I understand a lot of things now. I understand why Nero chose to follow Elish without even thinking. I understand why he tortured Reaver - at the time it seemed illogical to me, he must have known Silas would punish him, but now I can see why. Hatred is a powerful thing, and Nero's hatred is blind and overwhelming. I also understand Elish way better - I know now why it was so impossibly embarrassing and humiliating for him to admit his feelings to Jade. And to marry him in front of everyone! All things became clear.

'Severing Sanguine' is a beautiful, heartbreaking book. There is no one boring moment, I couldn't stop reading. This is an incredible, long story about a broken boy who has finally found the right place for him. I love Sanguine now, I love every dark and broken piece of him. I admire him for his strength, for his wisdom, for ability to survive no matter what, for his willingness to go on living. This is the kind of a book that you will never, ever forget and I'm grateful for that. It's one of the best books I have ever read.

I was more than honored to be chosen to beta read this book for Quil, and I pretty much did nothing but read and eat for the days it took me to finish this book, and it was only days. I just could not put it down. In one word, this book was amazeballs. I simply loved it from the first page to the last. Fans of Quil's stories will be more than happy with this glimpse into the life of one of the more enigmatic chimera's, Sanguine and just how he came to being.

But be warned: the story will rip you apart emotionally, tug at your heart, make your stomach heave and remind you that a bit of hope in the Greywastes is a truly fleeting thing.

We start off with infant Sami who is found dirty and hungry under a deck in the middle of the Greywastes. I have to say that little Sami about broke my heart. He was starved for love and wanted nothing more than to have a friend. It is very evident from the start that Sami is different, very very different from those around him and it is progressively revealed to the reader just how different he is through the first 8 years of his life. Quil writes Sami very realistically, he is young boy and his train of thought is spot on, to the point where I had to remind myself over and over that he is a chimera.

When the absolute unthinkable happens and the true horrors of life on the Greywastes are revealed to the reader through Sami's meeting with Jasper, I was both riveted and horrified, and like watching a train wreck, I knew it was coming but could only sit back as my poor, love starved, sweet little Sami was broken beyond repair.

Quil dealt with these situations with finesse, we know exactly what's happening but he didn't embellish the story for the shock value, this is an integral part of the story and it needed to be told. Through Sami we feel the confusion, the disgust and watch his slow decent into madness.

I don't want to go into detail as I will be spewing out spoilers left and right so I will just say that some of the moments in this book made my heart soar, I actually swore at Quil when Nero came into the story and was who he was, "Why?! Damn you!! Why did you make me love him!" (Fallocaust fans will know what I mean by that)

Even psycho King Silas has a few moments in this story that will make you laugh and love him a little before he reminds us, in a way that only he can, he was then and still is the Silas we know and hate. And Elish, sexy ice king Elish, seems so different here that I am sooooo looking forward to Quil bridging the gap between what was happening in this book and where we left off in *The Ghost and the Darkness VOL 2.*"

No, this story is not for everyone. Take the authors warnings to heart.
