Of course, I have still found time to read and have managed to read two novels a week, so now, I will try to write brief reviews on each of them.

This is the last book in the Taking Eve trilogy. I love Johansen's work, but I have to say the last book of this trilogy seemed to drag on, which is something I am unaccustomed to finding in her work. It seemed that the story could have ended with a few more chapters added to the second book in the trilogy; but rather than doing that, a great deal of filler was added to this book.

I am not saying that the book was not well written, I am simply saying that I found myself wanting to skip to the last couple of chapters and forget about what went on in the middle of the book.

This was by far the best book in the trilogy. It was fact paced, action packed and I read it in one sitting as soon as I downloaded it. I still hold my opinion that this series is going too much in the way of supernatural aspects, and find there to be too many supporting characters that keep jumping in to the action. In this book some of that served a purpose, but it makes me wary of future books. I am not sure if I will read the next book - it will depend on the plot and characters. The supernatural aspects are overtaking the plot and the initial storyline that was set-up. Part of me wonders if it is due to the initial storyline being resolved and the author needing to extend the series beyond it.
